2 Square Dance Welded, steel and aluminum

"Geometry in motion," *Square Dance* contrasts weathered and polished, light and dark, mass and space. It is a kinetic exploration in solid geometry.



1 Entangled Driftwood, slab wood, paint

This sculpture is about remaking discarded wood into a new conversational form. It enhances and combines individual unique shapes into one complex and delightful new expression of vibrancy.



3 Distant Steel, paint

The nude at figure drawing held his pose for hours, eyes fixed on a distant point, maintaining his mental distance under prolonged scrutiny. He and the chair becoming one.

4 Anoatuk White oak, aluminum, bronze

Anoatuk is an abstract sculpture with references to wooden boatbuilding methods and also incorporates references to Polynesian stick charts, plant structures and the gestural language of the human body.



6 Through the Moongate

Pressure treated new and repurposed lumber, downed tree trunks and limbs, living plants

This sculpture was inspired by traditional ornamental gardens in China offering welcome and good luck. Passage through our Moongate encourages viewers to become active participants, by contemplating transition.



5 Climbing Sustentaculum

Wood, burnt wood (pine) strengthened and stabilized by painted coatings

8 Ursus Angularis Welded steel

7 Covid Cocoons 3 boat forms, parachute line, paint, and wood

The boat forms represent two related ideas: voyage and transformation. When we finally emerge from our covid cocoons, what will we be like? Where will our new selves take us?



9 Now Here -Through the Looking Glass Ladder

10 Geranium Nylon Flag Fabric with UV protection, painted steel and heat-shrink tubing

11 PI + LOVE Concrete/recycled iron assemblage

A project that explores the human attraction to circles. This piece plays with contrasts: lightweight kinetic circles that move in a gentle breeze combined with the immobility of the concrete spheres.

12 Composition #1 Steel, rebar, cast concrete

13 Be a Ladder

14 Garden of Delight Wood, steel, brass, copper

15 Embrace Metal, sculpture

16 The Poppy Field Crocheted yarn poppies, black netting

The inspiration for this piece comes from the symbiotic communication between trees and fungi. They assist each other using a mycorrhizal network, transferring nutrients, carbon, and information along these intricate connections.

18 ESCAPE FROM NATURE Digital, aluminum, steel

ESCAPE FROM NATURE and ESCAPE TO NATURE is an absurdist exploration of the relationship between humans and their natural environment.





19 Hoo Goes There?

20 Earth Arch #2 Welded steel

21 Arise Steel, aircraft fabric, paint

Arise emerges from the earth like a blossom spreading and reaching towards the sun, or a body emerging from isolation. This piece is both celebratory and contemplative, like an awakening yawn facing the sun.

22 Blue Landscape Polychromed, steel, weathered plaster
